Brown County 4-H & Youth Development

Participation

- 2018 2019 4-H year we enrolled 334 members.
- We have reached over 1,200 youth this past year with programs ranging from Hatching in the Classroom, Youth Water Program, Take A Stand, Kids Kows & More and other youth engagement activities.

Volunteers Hours

Brown County 4-H volunteers (106) have contributed over 7,000 hours of their time this
past year. This comes out to \$157,850 donation to the program.

Outreach Programs

Hatching in the Classroom: The Goal is to increase knowledge of elementary students and teachers; therefore, they will show increased awareness about an agriculture product. Schools from: Bangs ISD, Early ISD, Brownwood ISD, Brookesmith ISD, Blanket ISD, May ISD and Victory Life Academy participate in this growing program. Grades range from 2nd to 7th. We had over 452 youth participate in this each year.

Reaching New Audiences with Programs

- Robotics: Robots are all around us. From the food we eat to the cars we drive, robots help
 make our lives easier and more efficient. The field of robotics is expanding at a rapid pace,
 and Brown County 4-H is poised to help lead young people into this exciting field. In the 4-H
 robotics project, youth will learn about the interconnections of science, engineering, and
 technology. There were 5 teams (20 youth) that are participating in this project.
- A Day in the Brown County Ring livestock show: This show will showcase differently-able students from across the county, and their 4-H/FFA member buddy, as they exhibit lambs at the Brown County Youth Fair.

 - 45 special ability youth participated
 - 44 4-H/FFA members volunteered.
 - o 400 hours contributed to this service project.

In addition, they will have the opportunity to meet and interact with the industry leaders of today and those preparing for tomorrow.

- Kids & Kows & More 3rd grade Ag Day allows over 315 students to become educated on where their food, clothing, and hygiene projects originate from. 4-H members are used to help with sessions and educate participants about the Brown County 4-H program.
- Take A Stand! Conflicts among youth and bullying have been increasing. School districts
 have been mandated by the Texas Legislature through House Bill 121 and 283 and Senate
 Bill 136 to adopt and implement a dating violence policy and a discipline management
 policy. These bills require training for teachers/staff, as well as, training/curriculum for youth.
